The Library of Congress homepage is organized logically into three columns, corresponding loosely with "Who We Are," "What We Have," and "What We Do." The following is an overview of the type of information that can be found in each column.

1 Section 1 is the Library of Congress Website header. It contains links to the Ask a Librarian, Digital Collections, and Library Catalogs pages.

# Column #1 Who We Are

- 2 Section 2, "About the Library," contains an image slider of featured topics. Users can click the links to access the featured item.
- 3 Section 3, "Visit the Library," features information about planning a visit to the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.
- 4 Section 4 highlights current exhibitions featured at the Library of Congress, as well as a link to interactive digital versions of past exhibitions.

# Column #2 What We Have

- Section 5 is the global search feature. Users can search the entire Library of Congress website, refining their search by format, subject, contributor, and date.
- 6 Section 6, "Collection Highlights," contains a selection of some of the most popular Library of Congress collections, including a section especially for Teachers.
- Section 7, "Featured Webcasts," highlights videos from a variety of topics and personalities. Click on More Webcasts to access the archive.
- 8 Section 8, "Explore & Discover," features frequently updated informational and educational content. Click on Blogs for a variety of unique topical perspectives.

# Column #3 What We Do

- Section 9 contains prominent links to beta.congress.gov (legislative information) and the U.S. Copyright Office, which is part of the Library of Congress.
- Section 10 has links to major Library resources and programs, and collaborative initiatives, including the Teaching with Primary Sources program and World Digital Library.
- Section 11, the "Services" area, contains a list of services the Library provides to the public, including the Ask a Librarian section, which allows for direct communication with knowledgable Library of Congress personnel.



Homepage highlight

Section 12, "Connect with the Library," has links to the Library's social media sites (Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, etc.), links to subscribe to RSS or email lists, and other useful information.
